Keeping Chicago Dry: Eliot Ness and the Untouchables

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How did we choose our topic?

A few years ago, one of our group members was able to visit the ever-so-famous, Alcatraz prison, where Capone was confined. This sparked our interest and we wondered who had been the cause of Capone's downfall. From here, we were led to Eliot Ness. Eliot Ness began as a starting point for us, which then had expanded to the entire clan of corruption-fighting prohibition agents, The Untouchables.

How did we conduct our research?

We began our research on the Internet, trying to obtain a background about Eliot Ness. After getting an understanding of his work and his impact, we started moving towards books, websites, images, and newspaper articles. We were fortunate to have been able to interview the author of *The Rise and Fall of an American Hero*, Douglas Perry, and the assistant manager of the American Prohibition Museum, Caitlin Hamilton. In addition, we were able to visit the Chicago History Museum, where which we were able to gather more information about Eliot Ness and Al Capone.

Why did we choose our category and how did we create our project?

Our decision to create a website in order to present our argument was based on our belief on how essential media would be to our project. Ness did not tolerate police officers who accepted bribes and fired them immediately. As a result of his stand, Ness has left behind a legacy of honesty and integrity in the law enforcement community.
